Fundraising key in Europe



Through sales of End Polio Now key finders between June 2010 and June 2011, Rotarians, Rotaractors, and RI staff in Switzerland and Liechtenstein raised more than US\$893,000 for Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge, including over \$2,000 from staff in the RI Europe/Africa Office.

Designed to attach to a key ring, each key finder has an identification number assigned to the owner. Lost keys can be dropped into any mailbox for delivery to an office that then returns the keys to their owner.

"The goal of our activities remains the complete eradication of polio in the world. Swiss and Liechtenstein Rotarians will fight for this great goal," says Urs Herzog, past governor of District 1980, chair of the Switzerland PolioPlus Committee, and PolioPlus national advocacy adviser, as well as a polio survivor.

Stepping out in Tanzania

More than 320 Rotarians and friends of Rotary walked through Moshi, Kilimanjaro, Tanzania, in June, raising about US\$38,000 for Rotary's challenge and increasing awareness of the polio eradication campaign. Leading

Voyage around Australia

Wilderness tourism entrepreneur Robert Pennicott and two companions are in the midst of a 13,800-mile journey around Australia to raise funds for polio eradication. Pennicott, a member of the Rotary Club of Kingston, Tasmania, Australia, and his fellow adventurers left Sydney, New South Wales, on 2 June in two rigid, inflatable dinghies. They are aiming to return to Sydney at the end of August.

A total of 92 percent of funds raised from the project, dubbed Follow the Yellow Boat Road, will be donated to Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge; the remainder will go to the Pennicott Foundation for island and coastal restoration projects in Australia and elsewhere. As of 22 July, contributions totaled about US\$110,000.

The project is backed by National Geographic, Qantas Airways, Tourism Australia, and other corporations and organizations. "Every cent I raise from this is going to outcomes," Pennicott says. "In my lifetime, I hope to make a substantial difference to the world."



the walk, which was organized by the Rotary Club of Moshi and several others, were a marching band, Rotarians wearing red End Polio Now T-shirts, and polio survivors.

Reginald Mengi, founder and executive chair of IPP Group, one of the largest conglomerates in East Africa, called on businesses to support polio eradication. "This is called corporate social responsibility," he said. "You must give back to the community."

Leading by example, Mengi personally contributed \$32,000 to the fundraising walk.

Both Mengi and Stephen Mwanje, 2010-11 governor of District 9200, encouraged parents to have their children immunized against polio.

"We must be aware and take all measures, since the disease can spread here within a short period of time," Mwanje said.

Pedaling in Pennsylvania

District 7370 (Pennsylvania, USA) sponsored a four-day, 330-mile bicycle tour of all 34 communities in the district that have a Rotary club, raising more than \$21,000 for Rotary's challenge. Rotarians and friends donated at least \$25 each to participate in the June event, called Rotary Pedals Out Polio. Most contributors donated as virtual riders, through the district's website.

"We had radio and newspaper coverage all through the district," says Past District Governor Jeff Coup, who came up with the idea for the tour and has served as the district's PolioPlus chair since the program began in
