

# Rosemary Stasek "Women in Afghanistan"

**Rosemary Stasek** lives in Kabul, Afghanistan working on reconstruction and development projects. She first traveled there soon after the fall of the Taliban leading projects directly benefiting women including the women's prison, maternity wards, political empowerment and employment training.



In 1999 she was selected by the Secretary of Defense to participate in the Joint Civilian Orientation Conference, which took her to military installations across the country and aboard an aircraft carrier in the Pacific Ocean. She broadened her knowledge of military affairs, especially issues involving women in serving in the Armed Forces. She serves as a member of the US Air Force Space Commanders Group.

**Stasek's** interest in international issues has taken her to Nepal, Ecuador, France, Britain, Holland, Germany, Italy, The United Arab Emirates, The Czech and Slovak Republics, Canada, Mexico, Thailand, Azerbaijan, South Africa, Venezuela, Tanzania and Vietnam. In 1998 she traveled to Cuba as a member of a special women's delegation and in May 2002 she was a member of one of the first delegations to return to Afghanistan.

**Rosemary** was born and raised in Northeast Pennsylvania and graduated from Cornell University with a Bachelor's degree in Economics. She was a Dean's List student and manager of the football and wrestling teams. She is currently serving a second term on the President's Council of Cornell Women.
